In Los Angeles Kayla Cromer of *Everything's Gonna Be OK*, a television series, talks on **ABC 7 Localish** *All Good* about a girl who wrote a friend-making app for her brother, an Oriental young man who plays music, and Alex Mann (a boy with social skills difficulties) talking to seventy police departments including Prospect Park police in Pennsylvania who support people with less social abilities, people who may be seen as noncompliant or resistant. Kayla talks about Sophia, a girl who owns Texas-made soap with her parents, a girl with a YouTube show about toys (a girl who is shy according to her father), and a boy who works with flowers (a parent who had him diagnosed at 18-months old where he was not as fast at talking as others, his mother said). I think this was a good presentation by Hollywood in response to the pressure to move awareness of this using television. (2021, April 7). "Everything's Gonna Be Okay" Star Kayla Cromer says, Hollywood has a long road to disability inclusion. My experience shows it's possible. She talks about the series and her own diagnosis with the category label. She says she was diagnosed with autism, dyslexia and dyscalculia. She talks about "masking" to avoid the labeling and stereotypes growing up, the social rejection. She labels this as a disability where others need to support, love and accept people who are different. The category and label have not been used as a main character of a series, she says.

I think Kayla is right in saying people with different social skill levels are not supported. It would be nice if we could be accepted although not as socially skilled as others. Cromer, Kayla. I agree with the idea to teach children to accept differences. Children began to reject kids as broken or defective around the age of 8 who are not doing it right, being the right color, etc. Children learn standards of behavior. The research still hasn't come to a decision about categories, such things as "autism", etc. preferring a more accurate dimensional approach then the old DSM categories, as they still don't have the understanding needed, and symptoms are not accurately described, but accepting others for being different is a good thing. I wonder what kind of cartoon the national research for the United States (NIMH) would support, if this is on target with

Sacramento

Spectrum News wrote on a **University of California**, Davis MIND Institute investigator, Derek Andrews, statement that an "autism-specific form of anxiety also tend to have an unusually small amygdala, a brain region associated with emotion processing and fear", and social anxiety, for example, involves a fear of rejection or judgment in social situations.

I think this a good idea, to look at the fear center of the brain suggested by this article. I remember learning from the BIG Five Personality study which the United States studied, that certain emotions such as "work" and "aggression" enlarged the volume of a part of the brain. Fear and withdrawing does not enlarge the volume. I saw these as strong emotions, although not saying talents do not come from the opposite, neither that people are defective who have fear and withdrawing. I wonder how their study compares to the regions of the brain studied in the Big Five Personality Study as increasing in volume.

Spectrum also talks about the California group previously finding that young autistic children with behavioral problems tend to have a larger amygdala, so children with what is being called autism, or lacking social skills, tend to have a large part of the brain when small, but then a smaller one, as time goes by. Rejecting others because they are not what the group, we are with, are doing and thinking and being, social rejecting, is the opposite of accepting.

Sometimes we can see their life differently. We see more of what they are. A lot of school, and communities, are choosing to accept people of different color, and abilities.

I like her article about accepting others. I think it's hard when labeling people with negative connotation. Is it really true about them?
